A change of clothes in your backpack is a great idea!






## Student Learning Survey 2025/2026

The Provincial Student Learning Survey is unique in its scope, size and usefulness to schools. It gathers information from parents/guardians/caregivers, teachers, and students on topics related to school environment, safety, and achievement. The information is used for planning in individual schools and provides a district and provincial perspective.

Early in **2026** the Student Learning Survey will be administered to students in grades 4 and 7, their parents/guardians/caregivers, and all school staff. We encourage parents/guardians/caregivers to participate in this survey, as the results are important in identifying and celebrating current strengths, as well as determining where the school needs to focus improvement. The surveys contain standard questions for the Province – in addition, questions from the school and/or district that focus on local conditions or issues may be included.

The survey can be completed electronically and can be accessed on the Internet at <https://www2.gov.bc.ca/gov/content/education-training/k-12/support/student-learning-survey>. Any computer or mobile device with an Internet connection can be used, and access to the e-survey is simple and secure. The survey can be accessed through the link and by clicking on Take the Survey. On the login page, click on the Parents icon, and then select the school district and school name where your child attends school. Provincial, District and School Reports for previous years can be viewed at the same site under the *Results* section.

The e-survey site will be open until May 2, 2026.

## Student Walking Safety

**As we head into winter with shorter daylight hours, we wanted to share some tips for students walking to bus stops and schools.**

- \* Be visible - Students should have some form of clothing, backpack or other item that is reflective, or some form of light to shine as they walk.
- \* Walk on sidewalks or paths – It is always best to walk on sidewalks or paths. If there are no sidewalks, walk facing traffic as far to the left as possible.
- \* Eyes up, phones down – be attentive while walking to avoid tripping and watch for traffic.

RE: Important Reminder Regarding Bus Cancellations and Student Transportation

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Dear Parents and Guardians,

As we move into the winter season, we would like to remind families of the procedures School District 28 follows regarding school bus cancellations. Please review the information below to ensure that you are prepared should service disruptions occur.

➤ **Check for updates**

Parents and students are responsible for checking official district communication channels for any bus cancellations. Notifications are posted on:

- The SD28 Website
- The SD28 Transportation Facebook Page

*Please note: The district is unable to make individual phone calls regarding bus cancellations.*

➤ **Types of cancellations**

- **Cold Weather Cancellation:** Quesnel schools remain open, but all school buses are cancelled for the entire day.
- **Individual Bus Cancellation:** A specific bus (e.g. bus XX) is cancelled for the entire day.

➤ **Individual Bus Cancellation Details**

If a bus is cancelled in the morning:

- It remains cancelled for the entire day.
- Families need to be aware of their assigned bus numbers for both morning and afternoon routes, including transfers.
- There is no replacement bus, including for transfer students.
- Students may only ride the bus they are registered on. They cannot switch to another bus.
- If you drive your child to school, please ensure you can pick them up after school.

➤ **Cold Weather Preparedness**

We ask that all students be dressed appropriately for winter conditions, including:

- Warm coats
- Winter boots or sturdy footwear
- Hats, mittens/gloves, and layers

While buses are heated, delays or emergencies are always possible. Proper winter clothing is essential for student safety.

Thank you for your cooperation and support in ensuring safe and consistent transportation for all students.

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## Bus Behaviour Expectations – Winter Reset

As we return from winter break, School District 28 is taking time to reset and refresh our student bus behaviour expectations. Our goal is to ensure every child enjoys a safe, respectful, and predictable ride to and from school.

We deeply value our partnership with parents and guardians. When expectations are reinforced at home, and supported on our buses, students feel secure, behaviour is more consistent, and everyone benefits. Supporting these expectations also helps our bus drivers stay focused on the road—where their full attention is needed to keep all students safe.

Transportation is a privilege for students, and it is a privilege we are happy to provide. By working together, we can keep the bus environment positive, safe, and welcoming for everyone.

### Bus Behaviour Expectations

- Sit safely at all times while the bus is moving.
- Speak respectfully, using an appropriate volume and language.
- Respect other riders, the bus, and the driver.
- Follow the driver's directions the first time.
- Keep all food and drinks off the bus.

### What Happens If Expectations Aren't Followed?

- 1** VERBAL REMINDER FROM THE BUS DRIVER
- 2** SECOND REMINDER, WITH THE DRIVER LETTING THE STUDENT KNOW THEY WILL RECEIVE A "WHITE, PINK, OR YELLOW SLIP."

### Understanding the Slips

**WHITE**

#### Reminder Only

- Several reminders were needed and behaviour did not stop.
- Manager logs the incident, informs the Principal, and emails the parent.

**PINK**

#### Step 1: First Written Warning

- Behaviour continued after reminders.
- Manager calls parents; Principal may be notified.

**YELLOW**

#### Step 2: Suspension from Bus

- Ongoing or serious behaviours (e.g., fighting, vaping, unsafe actions).
- Manager calls parents and the Principal; a 5-day suspension is issued. A meeting may be required before returning.

Thank you for supporting a safe and respectful transportation system. Please take a few minutes to review these expectations with your child before Monday, January 12, 2026. By working together, we help keep our buses safe and our drivers focused—ensuring a smooth and positive ride for all students.

Dear Parents and Guardians,

Our students in grade 3-7 will be skiing and snowboarding on February 23<sup>rd</sup> and February 26<sup>th</sup>. It should be a fun and exciting couple days at the hill. In preparation for the upcoming ski and snowboard days, please take note of the following:

- Please ensure your child has enough warm clothes (toques, mitts, winter coat, snow pants, long johns, sweater, etc.). It can be quite cold at the top of the hill. It is better to pack too many items than too few.
- It is recommended that your child brings extra clothes should some of their clothes get wet (extra socks, shirt/sweater, etc.).
- Please make sure your child brings an adequate lunch. There is a concession as well.
- Students who are on the lunch program will have a lunch that they will bring with them.
- We will be leaving the school for the hill at about 8:30 each morning. If a student is late, they will unfortunately have missed their ride. Please ensure that your child is on time for school.
- We will be returning to the school by approximately 4:15 pm each day. Please be at the school by these times to pick up your child.
- We have talked with the students about our expectations and our rules for when they are at the hill. Staff from the ski hill will also be giving a similar talk at the lodge prior to students going out on the hill. Students know that they will lose the privilege of skiing or snowboarding for the remainder of the day (and possibly the remaining ski day) if they have not followed the ski hill and school's rules for the day (no jumps, no skiing alone, no bush trails, being on time for their lesson, etc.). The staff at Troll is very clear about these rules and our school district is able to participate in the ski program because everyone is understanding of safety when out on the hill.

We are looking forward to two great days of skiing and snowboarding. Please contact the school if you have any questions about the upcoming trip.

 <b>Snapchat</b> Messages and photos disappear. Children can be pressured to send images because they believe they will not be saved. Location sharing can show where a child is in real time.	 <b>Roblox</b> Although it looks like a children's game, it includes chat features. Children can be contacted by strangers and slowly groomed through friendly game play.	 <b>Kik Messenger</b> Accounts can be anonymous. It is often used to move conversations away from apps parents may check.	 <b>Fortnite</b> Voice chat allows children to talk to strangers during games. Language and behaviour are often inappropriate.
 <b>TikTok</b> Children can see adult content, receive sexual comments, and be contacted by strangers. Live videos allow real-time interaction, which can quickly become unsafe.	 <b>Telegram</b> Messages and groups are encrypted, making them difficult to monitor. It is used to share sexual images, harmful material, and to keep conversations hidden from adults.	 <b>Hoop</b> The app connects directly to Snapchat and encourages children to add new contacts quickly, including people they have never met.	 <b>Reddit</b> Children can easily access sexual, violent, or extreme material through posts and comments.
 <b>Instagram</b> Messages allow strangers to contact children directly. Many children run secondary accounts that parents do not know about. There is strong pressure around appearance and popularity.	 <b>OmeTV</b> Random video chats with strangers. No effective safeguarding. Sexual content and adult behaviour are common. Children have no control over who appears on screen.	 <b>LiveMe</b> Children can broadcast themselves live to anyone watching. Viewers can comment in real time, including adults.	 <b>BeReal</b> The app prompts children to take photos instantly, which can lead to oversharing without thinking about safety.
 <b>WhatsApp</b> Private chats and group chats are often used for school or friendship groups, but bullying, exclusion, and sharing of images can happen quickly and spread widely.	 <b>Yubo</b> The app is designed to meet new people. Children can live stream and chat with strangers, which can quickly become sexual or exploitative.	 <b>Calculator+</b> These apps look like calculators but are used to hide photos, videos, and messages from parents and carers.	 <b>Twitch</b> Children watch and interact with live streamers through chat, which often includes adults and unmoderated comments.
 <b>Discord</b> Children join private chat servers linked to gaming or interests. These spaces are often unmoderated and can include adults, sexual content, or harmful language.	 <b>Monkey</b> Children are placed into random video chats with people they do not know. They have no control over who appears on screen.	 <b>YouTube</b> Children can be exposed to adult content through suggested videos, comments, and live streams, even when watching innocent clips.	 <b>Bumble</b> This is a dating app. Despite age limits, some under-18s access it to talk to adults looking for relationships.

## Safe & Caring School Environment

Unacceptable behaviour that is NOT tolerated in any activity sponsored by, organized by or participated in by the school regardless of the time or place:

Bullying, cyberbullying (during & after school hours)  
Retaliation against those reporting bullying  
Harassment, intimidation  
Threatening or violent behaviours  
Theft and vandalism  
Intoxicating or illegal substances  
Weapons or replica (toy) weapons  
Misuse of technology (personal electronic devices, computers, internet)  
Intruders or trespassers – visitors must first report to the office

**Notification**  
As circumstances warrant, school staff have a responsibility to inform:

Parents of students engaged in major and unsafe behaviours  
Parents of students on the receiving end  
Senior Administration, School Counselor, RCMP, Threat/Risk Assessment Team



## Inappropriate Behaviours

At Barlow Creek School, consequences for inappropriate behaviour are applied in a fair manner, respecting rights, responsibilities, age, maturity, special needs, and other factors relevant to the situation. We aim to use restorative, rather than punitive measures.

Inappropriate behaviours are those that do not follow the school expectations or beliefs and:

- Interfere with the learning of others
- Interfere with an orderly school
- Are unsafe.

May include:

*Rudeness, swearing  
Hands-on, fighting (or play fighting)*

*Defiant behaviour,*

*Throwing objects (rocks, sticks, snow, etc.)  
Lack of respect for others (teasing/name-calling)*

*Unauthorized leaving of school grounds*

*Other behaviours that disrespect Self, Others, and the Environment*

Consequences May Include:

*Review of expectations*

*Restitution and restorative measures*

*(apologies, actions to right wrongs)*

*Informing and/or meeting with parents*

*Time-out, removal from activities, loss of privileges*

*Development of behaviour plans*

*Out of school or in school suspensions*

*Working Team Meeting (Consultation with parents, Senior Administration, school staff, RCMP, etc., depending on the severity of the offence).*

## Personal Electronic Device Policy

## Code of Conduct Expectations

In the Barlow Creek Learning Community, we are committed to developing competent thinkers who are creative, flexible, self-motivated, health-conscious citizens with a positive self-image.

The school has a strong rural history that has developed over the years because of everyone's commitment to our children. Parents are involved and supportive. Teachers are committed to fostering a sense of belonging to create a warm culture and increase the frequency of pro-social interactions among students, staff, and families. Continuous school improvement is achieved by communication, collaboration, and in respecting people, their needs and their feelings.

Ministry and District policy restricts the use of personal electronic devices\* in schools. Students are expected to store their personal electronic devices in their backpack or leave them at home for the entire school day. This includes the use of personal electronic devices during recess and/or lunch.

**The following procedure will be used for violations of these expectations:**

STEP 1: Hand into office, returned at end of day.

STEP 2: Device to office and parent will need to pick it up end of the day.

STEP 3: Device Plan - device into a locked cabinet each morning and picked up at the end of the day (created with student, family, Principals; defined duration)

REFUSAL = move to step 3, then to In-School Suspension

### Purpose

The purpose of Barlow Creek's Code of Conduct is to establish and maintain a safe, caring, and orderly school that will enable purposeful learning and positive social development for all students.

### BC Human Rights Code

At Barlow Creek Elementary School, we believe that all children have the right to learn in a safe, caring and orderly environment. A calm, safe, compassionate environment supports developing positive personal relationships. We promote the values expressed in the BC Human Rights Code respecting the rights of all individuals in accordance with the law—prohibiting discrimination based on race, colour, ancestry, place of origin, religion, family status, physical or mental disability, gender, sexual orientation, gender identity or expression.

At Barlow Creek Elementary School, appropriate behaviours are a part of our BLAZERS positive behaviour system. Influenced by Indigenous ways of knowing, Metis values and learner traits, students and staff work together to develop the behaviours for BLAZERS.

Daily recognition of the behaviours in BLAZERS allows a common language and understanding of the expected behaviours at school.

Barlow BLAZERS are:

Brave — take chances, try new things, and persevere when faced with challenges

Learners — deep thinkers and ask questions to further understanding and show their learning in a variety of ways.

Accepting — be kind and include others, embrace different view points.

Zippy — enthusiastic and active, excited about learning and have a positive attitude. Earthly — take care of the environment, only use what you need, and be a good citizen.

Responsible — make good choices and do the right thing.

Self-aware — understand yourself, regulate your emotions, and take care of your mind, body, and heart.
